Delphi's 2 Mile Relay broke two records the 26th of April—the Attica Invitational Class A record and the Delphi Community High School record with a 8:27.2 time. Running the relay were Dave Martin, Rex Wilson, Dan Kirkpatrick and Carter Riley. Delphi placed third overall in Class A, with Rensselaer and Crawfordsville finishing ahead of Delphi. The team also finished third in the Sprint Medley, Mile Relay, the freshman 440 Relay, and fourth in the Distanced Medley. Don Smith placed fourth in the High Jump and Long Jump. In the Pole Vault, Steve Wilcox took first and Phil Walker, third..

## TWO QUALIFY FOR REGIONAL

West Lafayette rolled to its sixth straight Hoosier Conference track championship with a record 105 points. Carroll finished second with 41 points. with Delphi and Rossville tied for third with 37.

Delphi received seconds in the Mile and Two Mile Relays with Carter Riley placing second in the 880. Don Smith placed third in both the long jump and high jump; and Steve Wilcox third in the pole vault. In the Mile, Rex Wilson finished fourth to round out the teams 37 points.

Logansport retained the C.I.C. track championship with nine first; to West Side's, four; and to Lafayette Jeff and Delphi, one each. West Lafayette finished second followed by Jeff, Frankfort, and Delphi.

Steve Wilcox tallied the only first in the Pole Vault, and Don Smith finished third in the Long Jump and fourth in the High Jump. In the Mile, Rex Wilson finished fifth, and in the 440's, Matthews and Wingard both finished fifth.

Running the Sectional after two postponements, Delphi placed two individuals in the Regional at Fort Wayne on Friday. Carter Riley placed third in the 880, and Steve Wilcox went 13 feet to finish second in the Pole Vault.

## BETH'S FAREWELL

Nine months ago I left Rio, by plane, with more than 149 Brazilian students. This was August 6, 1968. And it doesn't seem it's been so long! Anyway, we arrived in New York on August 7, at 3:00 in the morning. Then, I left New York to Indianapolis by bus and I finally got there on August 10, very early in the morning. One of the things that I can remember clearly is how anxious I was to meet "my family". I didn't idealize it, because I knew that they would be a nice family, but never could realize that it would be just "the family", the one that was just to be mine. And when I met them, I felt already that I'd known for a long time.

I got here just in time to see the last day of "Old Settlers". I'll never forget it! I met the whole town! And I still find people who ask me that hard question: Don't you remember me from Old Settlers?

But, this day was the day I started my real struggle with English. That was when I realized how poor my English was and what I had got from learning it for 3 years. People talked too fast by then, now it seems that they have the right rhythm.

I still can remember the first day I went to school, I was so depressed, so disappointed with myself! Everybody was extremely nice, but I still felt I was a little out of everything. I had at the same time fear and courage; fear to put up with the difficulties and courage to fight against them. But luckily, and with everyone's help I got over that, and started being a Delphi Community High School kid. That transformation was quicker than I expected. But the date I cannot state precisely is the day I started understanding the English and even talking it! That was gradual. Each day I had something new to learn (I still do), and I didn't learn by myself, I learned with you all, by living with you.

There are so many things that I can't forget, that is just impossible to name all of them!

I know I am not the only "exchange student" you've ever had, but you are the only Delphi I've ever had in all my life....and I'll never forget you. I just wish that Delphi was across the street from Brasilia.....
